A New Beginning!

A large illustration of a sailing ship, center right, introduces the ocean voyage to Texas. Here an environment is created through light and sound. Water texture is projected on to the walls, floor, and visitors near the ship. This projection, accompanied by localized audio stories and sound effects, immerses visitors in the experience. One hears wind in the sails, sailors barking orders to one another, gulls crying, and the sound of waves and water on the hull of the ship.

A dramatic, internally illuminated illustration, center, provides a view of the settlers gathering under the Great Oak in Panna Maria and Father Moczygemba offering a Christmas Midnight Mass of Thanksgiving. Candles and torches held by the people in congregation illuminate the scene. Reflected lighting, like torchlight and candlelight filtering through the leaves of the trees, is projected onto the walls and floor in front of this display. As the lighting falls on the visitors, they become part of the scene and experience. Additionally, localized audio is projected into the same area, and the sounds of Mass being sung in Latin, members of the congregation whispering to each other, and Christmas Carols being sung in Polish augment the sense of being part of the story.

To the far left of the historic Mass of Thanksgiving illustration, begins the story of the next milestones the settlers would face—the challenges of getting started in a new and often unforgiving land.


Week 2, September 12th, It is amazing how the inside looks when you put up the metal studs and you can more easily visualize the interior spaces.

<p>Neither I nor my family are from Texas, why should I contribute to this?</p>	<p>This is a <u>national</u> heritage center. It celebrates the first-ever Polish settlement in the United States of America dating from 1854. It is listed on the United States Registry of Historic Places. Panna Maria has long held a spot in the hearts of millions of Polish-Americans coast-to-coast. Some Poles were here before 1854, but were integrated into existing communities. The Center also tells the history of Poland that helped determine the decisions made by those immigrant settlers in 1854.</p>

Your Royalty Income Can Help Complete the Polish Heritage Center!

In the beginning, in ancient geological eras millions and millions of years ago, God's plan resulted in the vast oil and gas deposits that benefit humankind worldwide today. Truly, a gift from God. Many, in the Eagleford Shale Geological Area, a slumbering energy powerhouse that extends over 26 Texas counties, have benefitted from that gift.

The first depletion allowance in the United States, called the "discovery depletion", was enacted by Congress in 1918. This benefit from our government has been modified many times since. That gift and that benefit, combined, supply the treasure and reduce the taxes of the descendants of our early Polish settlers.

In the last issue of this newsletter we highlighted the taxation benefits of royalty income when the **depletion allowance deduction of 15%**, the tax savings attributable **to a donation**, and the tax savings attributed to the **investment tax of 3.8%** on income above \$250,000 **when they are considered together**. We cited several simplified examples in that newsletter to which we ask you to refer. Our examples were meant to illustrate the total tax saving.

We offer a summary example, below:
